Leading Artists and Writers to Headline New Summer Salons Series at Provincetown's Renowned Fine Arts Work Center

Tracy K. Smith, Catherine Opie, Helen Molesworth, Sarah Schulman, and Major Jackson among the guests leading a series of intimate conversations and workshops beginning May 31st

Provincetown, MA (May 20, 2024) - Poets Tracy K. Smith, Major Jackson, Jane Hirshfield, and Roger Reeves, along with curator Helen Molesworth, photographer and artist Catherine Opie, author Sarah Schulman, and journalist Peter Slevin, are set to headline a series of intimate weekend conversations and workshops at the <u>Fine Arts Work Center</u> this summer.

The <u>Summer Salons</u> events aim to foster a dynamic exchange of ideas by bringing together two prominent figures from the arts and culture sphere to the Work Center. Scheduled over four weekends spanning from early June to early September, the series offers a rare chance for audiences in Provincetown and beyond to directly connect with some of today's most influential creative minds.

The weekends will commence on Friday evenings with a reception, leading into a free-flowing, unmoderated conversation between the two featured guests, followed by an audience Q&A session. For those unable to attend in person, the Friday Night conversations will be live-streamed. On Saturday afternoons, one of the featured guests will facilitate a 10-person workshop in the Work Center's Stanley Kunitz Common Room, and the other featured guest will conduct a larger workshop via Zoom.

All event ticket sales proceeds will support the Fine Arts Work Center's commitment to providing free arts and culture events for the Outer Cape Cod community throughout the year. These events, including FAWC Fridays, Fellow Fridays, free nightly talks by artists during the summer, and exhibitions, have solidified the Work Center's reputation as a dynamic cultural hub, lauded as a community "anchor" by The Provincetown Independent. Ticket prices start at \$100 (general) and \$50 (students/teachers) for Friday night conversations and \$150 (general) and \$75 (students/teachers) for workshops. Tickets and workshop registrations can be purchased here.

Roger Reeves is the author of *Best Barbarian*, a finalist for the National Book Award and the Kingsley Tufts Poetry Award winner. His newest book is *Dark Days: Fugitive Essays*.

Sarah Schulman is a novelist, nonfiction writer, playwright, screenwriter, and AIDS historian. The author of *Let The Record Show: A Political History of ACT UP New York* 1987 - 1993, she holds an endowed chair in creative writing at Northwestern University and is on the Advisory Board of Jewish Voice for Peace.

Peter Slevin is a contributing writer for The New Yorker, where he focuses on politics. As The Miami Herald's European correspondent, he covered the 1989 revolutions in Central Europe and the collapse of the Soviet Union. He spent a decade on the national staff of The Washington Post, writing about foreign policy and, later, politics, including the 2008 Obama campaign. His book – *Michelle Obama: A Life* – was a finalist for the PEN America biography prize.

A Fine Art Work Center Trustee, member of the Writing Committee, and Fellow (2000-2001), Major Jackson is the author of six books of poetry, most recently *Razzle Dazzle: New & Selected Poems*. He serves as the Poetry Editor of *The Harvard Review* and host of the poetry podcast *The Slowdown*.

Jane Hirshfield's ten poetry books include the newly published *The Asking: New & Selected Poems*, a finalist for the 2001 National Book Critics Circle Award; and *After*, named a "best book of 2006" by The Washington Post, The San Francisco Chronicle, and England's Financial Times.
