FAWC x PAAM Launch Fellow Fridays with New Work by Fine Arts Work Center Fellows

Provincetown, MA (January 16, 2026) - The Provincetown Art Association and Museum (PAAM) presents the fellows of the Fine Arts Work Center, an exhibition marking the first public presentation of new work created during the artists' Fine Arts Work Center residencies.

On view January 16 through March 8, 2026, the exhibition brings together work by ten current Visual Arts Fellows and serves as the kickoff event for Fellow Fridays, a spring series of exhibitions and readings hosted by the Fine Arts Work Center.

The exhibition includes sculpture, assemblage, painting, printmaking, photography, and multimedia. Spanning figurative, abstract, and conceptual approaches, the artists engage a range of concerns, from the porous boundary between spirituality and fantasy to the intersection of materiality and memory. Collectively, the works examine questions of place and representation, and how each shapes the other, as well as the layered histories of liberation and representation embedded within the American landscape.

Following the opening at PAAM, Fellow Fridays extends the fellows' public presentation of work through a series of five events at the Fine Arts Work Center's 24 Pearl Street campus. Each evening pairs a focused presentation by the Visual Arts Fellows in the Hudson D. Walker Gallery with readings by Writing Fellows in the Stanley Kunitz Common Room, offering audiences an opportunity to encounter work across disciplines as it continues to develop during the residency.

The exhibition at PAAM features work by the 2025–26 Fine Arts Work Center Visual Arts Fellows: Lacey Black, Abigail Dudley, Nick Fagan (Second-Year Fellow), Yacine Tilala Fall, Calhan Hale, Dominique Muñoz, Tess Oldfield, Anne Clare Rogers (Second-Year Fellow), Michael Waugh, and Carlie Trosclair.

PAAM will host an opening reception with the artists on Friday, January 16, 2026, at 6:00 PM.
